maintain full or provisional registration with CPSM while in an additional residency program (e.g., formally called "fellows" in some programs) have the same prescribing authority as other fully licensed physicians. They can elect to pursue prescribing approvals for methadone and/or buprenorphine/naloxone. Such physicians who opt instead to maintain an educational licence with CPSM during their residency would have to follow the same prescribing rules as residents. They also cannot be granted prescribing approvals for methadone and/or buprenorphine/naloxone. A prescriber's licensure can be verified on CPSM's website <u>here</u>.

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Pharmacist For a summary of all permitted pharmacist prescribing activities, please see <u>here.</u>	College of Pharmacists of Manitoba	Provide a Continued Care Prescription	A pharmacist is authorized to refill a prescription beyond those authorized on the original prescription if: a) the patient has a continuing need or a chronic condition which is considered stable; b) the prescribing practitioner has died or retired within the previous six months or the prescribing practitioner has not responded to a refill authorization request and it would be onerous or impossible for the patient to contact or attend the original practitioner issuing the prescription in a timely manner; c) the patient's history with the prescribed drug has not changed; d) the patient has not experienced any adverse reactions to the medication; and e) the prescription was originally filled by the same pharmacy. The pharmacist must promptly notify the original prescribing practitioner, unless the practitioner is deceased or retired.	A benzodiazepine cannot be renewed through continued care unless the drug is used to manage a convulsive disorder or if there is a risk of a seizure due to sudden withdrawal of the medication. In the event of a public health emergency affecting all or part of the province, the Minister of Health may notify CPhM to authorize pharmacists to prescribe drugs beyond their current scope. Upon approval by Council, members may prescribe under Council-specified conditions until the emergency concludes. 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Notes

** Manitoba pharmacists can fill prescriptions for health professionals listed as "designated practitioners" in the <u>Pharmaceutical (General</u> <u>Matters) Regulation</u>, subject to having prescribing authority in their home province. Designated practitioners include the following:

- 1. A pharmacist authorized to practice pharmacy in Manitoba or another Canadian province or territory;
- 2. A registered nurse authorized to practice registered nursing in Manitoba or another Canadian province or territory;
- 3. An optometrist authorized to practice optometry in Manitoba or another Canadian province or territory;
- 4. A midwife authorized to practice midwifery in Manitoba or another Canadian province or territory;
- 5. A **registered psychiatric nurse** authorized to practice registered psychiatric nursing in Manitoba or another Canadian province or territory;
- 6. A **podiatrist** authorized to practice podiatry in Manitoba or another Canadian province or territory.

Manitoba pharmacists may also fill prescriptions from **out-of-province physicians**, **veterinarians**, **and dentists**, <u>with some exceptions</u>. Please see CPhM's <u>Electronic Transmission of Prescriptions FAQ</u> and the <u>M3P FAQ</u> for more information on out-of-province prescriptions.

At this time, pharmacists in Manitoba cannot dispense prescriptions from in-province or out-of-province naturopaths (or any other healthcare professional not listed above) even if they have prescriptive authority in their own province.
